End of term awards

As we have in previous years, we will be looking to give out awards to children who have gone above and beyond this academic year.

As a reminder, there are sports awards for upper and lower stages, a friendship trophy, and four shields which exemplify the values we most want to pass on to the children. Those are for children who are – or have made notable improvements in becoming

- Confident individuals

- Responsible citizens

As we have done before, this term the staff will be paying particular attention to the children's achievements with an eye on the best candidates for the awards. If you as parents would like to nominate any children, please feel free to do so and we will gather all the nominations and suggestions towards the end of the year.

If your child received an award last year, if they could take them back to school now that would be appreciated. It will give us time to organise the engraving for the award day.



Vision, Values and Aims

It has been a long time since Foveran last looked at our school vision, values and aims. It's time to have a close look at them and ensure they are aligned with the families and community in Foveran as it is today.

Our school motto, '*Hand in hand towards excellence*', is well known in the school. As is our ambition to instil in the children the four capacities: *Successful Learners, Confident Individuals, Responsible Citizens, and Effective Contributors*. Most children in the school can name these and tell you what they mean.

The next step for us is to put together a statement, a vision that represents what is most important to our school community. It is important that we get as many people involved in this as we can.

To that end, the upper stages class have been investigating values and what they mean. They have made a series of short videos which we will look at in our assemblies and choose our favourites. When we have a good selection and the children know what they represent, we hope to take them to the wider community, most likely at a community café, and the children can let you know why they think a particular value is important. Collectively we will vote to find the values that are most important in our community, and this will form the basis of our vision for the school for the coming years.

Healthy Snack options

We try to promote healthy snacking in school wherever we can. There's nothing wrong with the odd treat and we enjoy spoiling our children on special occasions. That said, if we can get into good daily habits, this will help the children to be healthier, more able to concentrate and reduce the effect of the sugar high and the sugar crash that can have such a detrimental effect on their day.

Many parents are already ensuring that children have healthy snacks. When a few bring less healthy options though, it can lead to other children feeling like they are missing out.

Sometimes, it just seems easier and more convenient to provide children with less healthy options – and sometimes it's hard to know what alternatives are out there. With that in mind, I've attached a flyer from the NHS with suggestions and ideas for healthy play pieces.



School houses

Reporting to parents

We hope to issue our written reports on the 13th of May, and we will once again have some parents' evenings on the 24th and 25th May.

These reports are only a part of our annual reporting calendar. We are once again able to make use of SeeSaw and we will be developing this into a pupil profile that will be built up over the year. We still use the ever-popular Facebook for whole school updates.

Community cafés, open afternoons and events will soon give you more opportunities to come into school and see the children's progress in person. Alongside all of this however, we hope you know that our door has always been open (virtually before but now literally), and we are very happy to chat with you at any point about anything at all. Please feel free to catch us at drop off or pick up times or get in touch at any time to make an appointment if you have any concerns. On a related note, if we have any concerns, we will try to bring it up with you directly without waiting for more formal opportunities like reports and parents' evenings, so nothing should come as a big surprise when the reports are sent home in May.

Self-evaluation and questionnaires

With the beginning of a new term and the optimistic feeling of turning a corner on the pandemic, it seems a good time to draw our focus once again on the improvement of the school.
